The First Reading

Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord GOD. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

The Holy Gospel

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew.People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

People And call upon your Name.

Intercessor Christ the King, you care for those in prison: give us hearts for all those who are incarcerated. Where there is crime and violence in our community, offer your peace. We give you thanks, O Lord;

People And call upon your Name.

Intercessor Christ the King, you are good: we pray you seek the lost, bind up the injured, and strengthen the weak. We pray especially for Callen, Thomas, James, Diana, James, Carol, Susan, Lee, Arlene, Barbara, Mike, Jack, Chuck, Joan, David, Peter, Liz, Ann, Jack, Pat, Kathy, Dick, Scott, Martin, Ann, Melinda, Aaron, Dann and Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. We also remember those we name now either silently or aloud. We give you thanks, O Lord;

People And call upon your Name.

Intercessor Christ the King, your faithfulness endures from age to age: may all your saints, at work and at rest, know the hope to which you have called us and the riches of your glorious inheritance. We give you thanks, O Lord;

People And call upon your Name.

Let us pray for our own needs and those of others.

The People may add their own intercessions either silently or aloud. Silence may be kept.

We confess that we have taken the abundance of your world for granted: make us urgent now for its protection.

Forgive and renew us now through our Savior Jesus Christ, by the power of the Holy Spirit, with whom you live and reign, one God, now and for ever. Amen.




Through the Spirit you continue to call us into covenant with you—for the restoration of Creation and the reconciliation of all people.

All are welcome to come forward, as directed by ushers, to receive communion or a blessing. Please wait for the Ushers and follow their instructions. When you reach the center of the space, please open your hands and lay them flat to receive the bread or cross your arms over your chest to receive a blessing. You may then choose to drink from the silver chalice to your left or intinct (dip the wafer in the wine) in the clay chalice to your right. If you do not wish to receive wine, simply pass the cup, and make your way back to your seat. We believe Jesus is fully present in both the bread and the wine, so if you receive the bread, you have participated fully in communion. Let the Priest know if you need a gluten free wafer by first extending your palms down. If you would like to have communion brought to your pew, please let an Usher know.



Frequently Asked Questions About Pledging What is a pledge?

A pledge is a financial promise to support our parish and its missions in the coming year. Your pledge is an act of faith that connects you more deeply to our church. Many find spiritual joy in making a generous pledge to support God's work through the church. While pledges guide our budget for the year, they can be adjusted, up or down, if your circumstances change.

Why is it important to pledge?

Scripture is clear on many occasions about the teachings of Jesus and others, including St. Paul, that God expects us to give back to our community faith and to God out of gratitude. The Episcopal Church also sees a pledge as an important part of membership. No matter the size of this gift, your pledge is a sacred gift to be discerned with God. Whether it's \$10, \$100, \$5,000 or \$50,000, we give thanks for the best you and God can put forward this year.

Don't we have an endowment?

We are blessed to have an endowment fund that supports a portion of our annual budget and our mission efforts. As good stewards, we strive to preserve the principal for future needs or emergencies and use only a small draw (4% of average principal) each year to offset a portion of our annual expenses.

Don't we get money from the Diocese?

It's actually the other way around! Episcopal churches raise most of their operating funds from members. Unlike some churches, we are not funded from the top down. Your pledges or gifts go directly to our parish, and we are then charged an annual assessment to support the larger church at the diocesan (state) and national levels.

What's the difference between a gift and a pledge?

A pledge indicates your commitment to the parish, your intention to support the mission of God in the year ahead. Gifts are always welcome and appreciated and God delights in them, however, they don't allow us to plan responsibly or to look ahead. Pledges help us to plan responsibly for God's mission and your care.


