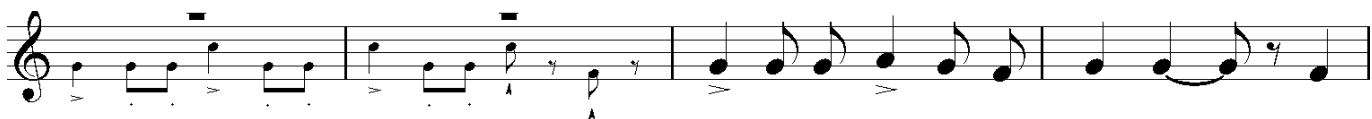

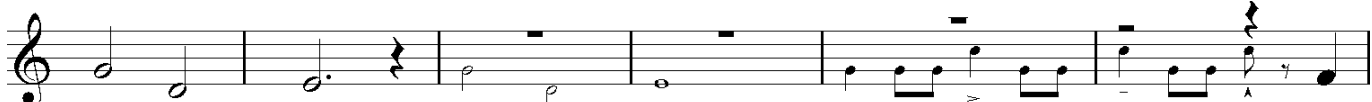

The First Reading

Acts 11:1-18

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three

times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

The Nicene Creed

iConfirm – Sunday, June 5th at the 10:00am Service

Our confirmands have been meeting since October and are in the final preparations for being confirmed this Spring. Most of them who choose to be confirmed will gather at Christ Episcopal Church in Greenwich on Saturday, June 18 to receive the laying-on-of-hands by Bishop Smith.

We will honor all our confirmands at the 10:00am service on June 5, the Feast of Pentecost with the *iConfirm* service as part of our regular liturgy of Holy Eucharist. *iConfirm* provides an opportunity for youth to share what they have learned and for the rest of the congregation to learn from them. It allows the congregation to honor the work the youth have done through the *Confirm not Conform* program. And it complements the premise of confirmation: that youth are making a mature affirmation of their faith and the promises made on their behalf at baptism. In the confirmation service itself, confirmands often have a very minor role to play, or are limited to answering questions put to them in a scripted way. In the Episcopal Church's Rite of Confirmation, confirmands are assigned only two words to say: I do. They have no opportunity to share what they have learned or why they have decided to make this commitment to their faith. However, they DO reaffirm their Baptismal Covenant together with the congregation present and then receive the laying-on-of-hands from a bishop as he/she prays for strength from the Holy Spirit to continue to be with them on the lifelong spiritual faith journey.

Since the basic premise of the *Confirm not Conform* program is that youth have a voice and something to say that the church needs to hear, we feel it is vitally important to provide a forum within the church for them to speak. Whether or not they choose to be confirmed, youth who go through *CnC* think hard and deeply about matters of faith, and the church is enriched from hearing what they have to say. The primary voices of the service are those of the youth who have a chance to talk about what they have learned and what they believe, and in so doing educate and inspire the gathered congregation. Additionally, the *iConfirm* service honors the work and witness of the community. The youth are not doing their work in a vacuum; there are teachers, mentors, parents, and many others involved. Even those who are not actively part of the program are part of this community of faith. This service and celebration honors the commitment on both sides. Through prayers, teachings, acknowledgments, gifts, and the celebration itself, a new relationship is built between the community and its youth.

Working with Jerusalem Peacebuilders

St. Matthew's is one of many houses of worship partnering with The Jerusalem Peacebuilders, which consists of visiting Jewish, Muslim and Christian youth from Israel and Palestine, for a day of service on Sunday, August 7th to serve the city of New Haven.



The St. Matthew's community was introduced to this opportunity, and its supporting organization, through the founder, the Rev. Canon Nicholas Porter (who will be with us and preaching on May 22). The mission of Jerusalem Peacebuilders as an interfaith, non-profit organization is *"to create a better future for humanity across religions, cultures, and nationalities. Integral to that mission is the belief that the future of Jerusalem is the future of the world. To that end, JPB promotes transformational, person-to-person encounters among the peoples of Jerusalem, Israel, Palestine, and the United States."*

Our parish believes wholeheartedly in the importance of building loving relationships across religious difference. We have a long history of participating in this work in Wilton and beyond. This is yet another opportunity for us to put our love into action. Please plan to join us at church on Sunday, May 22nd at 10am to hear from the Rev. Canon Porter. Please also plan to stay after church that day for a special forum he'll lead about Jerusalem Peacebuilders.

Then, join us on August 7th as we put our faith in action, work alongside our brothers and sisters of faith and demonstrate what peace and love for our neighbor look like. While this is taking place during our usual Sunday morning service, we're hoping many of you will consider this your worship for that day.

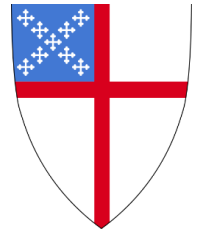
