The intentional redaction of the particulars of this history from our common history books and basic vital records has now been unsealed for us, revealing this great stain, and opening our eyes in head-shaking bewilderment. We had no way to prepare for what we have learned.

We cannot unring that bell.

We cannot remove the great stain. It is our birthmark, the blemish on our country's face that we have tried to cover up with foundational make-up since our founding. We *can* stop hiding it now. We need to point it out and talk openly about it when people question it, uncomfortable and terrible and embarrassing as it is. It is the only way to remember and restore the worth and dignity of the all-but-forgotten.

We cannot unring the bell, but today, we can point out our birthmark, leave it bare, bring our full attention to it. John C Wally, bell ringer, help us ring the bell noisily, like an alarm.
