





Dear People of God: On this day of Pentecost, let it be our joy to hear again the story of God's love, to trace together the presence of the Holy Spirit throughout salvation history. Let us hear once again the promise that the Holy Spirit dwells among us, breathing life into us. Let us remember our baptisms, when we received the gift of the Holy Spirit and entered into God's life and mission. Together, let us hear and heed in Holy Scripture the loving, persistent, and joyful passion of the Spirit that is slowly perfecting us and all of creation. And may our celebration this day invite us more deeply into the resurrection life of Jesus Christ who sends us the Holy Spirit: that we might never be alone, that we and all of creation might have life and have it abundantly.

But first, let us pray for the needs of the whole world, for peace and justice on earth, for the unity and mission of the Church for which our Lord Jesus Christ died, and especially for the faithful in our country, in our local communities, and all over the world.

And because God particularly loves them, let us remember in the name of Jesus the poor and the helpless, the sick and the lonely, the oppressed and the unloved, the aged and little children, and all those who suffer in this season under the weight of grief, anxiety, and fear.

And now, to capture all these prayers, let us pray in the words that Jesus himself has taught us, saying:

**Our Father in heaven,

The Fourth Lesson

Matthew 3:13-17

Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, 'I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?' But Jesus answered him, 'Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfil all righteousness.' Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.'

The Fifth Lesson**Acts 2:1-21**

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-- in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

 `In the last days it will be, God declares,
 that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,
 and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions,
and your old men shall dream dreams.
Even upon my slaves, both men and women,
in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.

The Sixth Lesson

1 Corinthians 12:3b-13

No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body-- Jews or Greeks, slaves or free-- and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Music Lab Wednesdays





The program is entitled Music Lab Wednesdays and will be delivered at no cost via OpusYou, a world leader in the field of K-12 music education. OpusYou, in cooperation with the Music Ministry of St. Matthew's, revitalizes performing arts for at-home audiences and offers music education resources at no cost.

During a time when local events are cancelled and people are encouraged to stay at home, St. Matthew's is pleased to bring music and the arts into the lives of Fairfield County residents through live educational performances. Lasting 25 minutes, each program will guide audiences through a musical journey, explored through an immersive virtual performance, followed by a question and answer session with Ellaway and guests. 

Christian Meditation: Learn the Basics

The next series of pages will quickly link you to eastern religions and lead you to believe that this is a practice that isn't closely tied to our Christian faith. While we can always learn from our siblings of other faiths, meditation is also an ancient part of our tradition and heritage.

It's true that meditation can have tremendously positive effects on our physical and mental health. And it can serve as the door if we are seeking the presence of God. Join us for a 4-part series as we explore the basics of Christian meditation. You'll have a chance to read, learn, and begin to practice.

We'll read James Finley's book, *Christian Meditation*, which is available [on amazon](#) and kindle. 
